Eric van Soeren was raised in Toronto and educated at the universities of Toronto and British Columbia. He qualified as a chartered accountant with Coopers Lybrand and joined the B.C. Job Protection Commission in 1991. From 1997 to 2002, he was the job protection commissioner. Van Soeren is now a management consultant.

**John A. Horning**

John Horning was raised in Victoria and received a business administration degree from the University of British Columbia. He was a partner in a forest firefighting and forestry consulting firm for 15 years, and president and CEO of Pacific Coach Lines Ltd. for 10 years. He joined Interfor in 1998, where he is currently vice-president of finance and corporate development.

**Harvey Arcand**

Harvey Arcand has worked in the forest industry since graduating from Langley senior secondary school in 1968. He was president of the Williams Lake local of the Industrial, Wood and Allied Workers of Canada from 1977 to 1993, and was elected fourth vice-president of the national organization in 1992 and second vice-president in 1998. In 2001 he became secretary-treasurer. Arcand chairs the audits, investment and appeals committee of the IWA.

**Ken Dyson**

Ken Dyson has worked in the forest industry since 1965: for MacMillan Bloedel until 1970 and for himself since then. Since 1979 he has been a partner in Holbrook Dyson Logging of Campbell River. He sat on the board of the Truck Loggers Association from 1988 to 2000 and was president from 1997 to 1999.

Bill Harrison was educated in Armstrong, Wenatchee Valley College in Washington and the University of the Americas in Mexico City. He worked in community newspapers before beginning a 34-year teaching career with the Campbell River school district. He has served on Campbell River city council since 1986 and currently holds the community economic development and air transportation portfolios.

Tim Sheldan received his post-secondary education as a forest resource technologist at Nanaimo's Malaspina College.
